Wolfspeed Named Area Development Project of the Year

CREE Wolfspeed's Wafers Key to Charging of EVs

North Carolina-based CREE Inc. is building a billion-dollar factory near the New York community of Utica, 1 and silicon carbide wafers could start

moving off the line in early 2022. This particular chip technology is seen as a key to reducing charging time and increasing the range of electric vehicles, and it's also helpful in everything from 5G infrastructure to solar inverters.

As production continues to build over the next several years at the Mohawk Valley plant, the company expects to employ more than 600 people, about half that total as early as 2023. Despite the pandemic, construction moved ahead nicely in 2020 and early 2021, and work began on a pilot production line at SUNY Polytechnic Institute in Albany. The project is getting a boost of as much as half a billion dollars in the form of a state grant if project goals are met.



CARES ACT- COVID-19 SMALL BUSINESS GRANTS

MICRO-ENTERPRISE GRANTS

\$750,000 Awarded

- Up to 100% of prior eligible costs, up to 40% of projected project costs
- Project must be completed within one year
- Zero new equity required of the borrower
- Retained and/or created jobs must be certified
- Bank financing is not required, but encouraged for post-application recovery projects
- Public funds from other programs can be used for the balance of a recovery project

\$200,000 Awarded

- Up to 90% of the total project cost, with a maximum grant amount of \$35,000
- Project must be completed within two (2) years
- Minimum of 10% new equity contribution to the project is required by the borrower
- Training costs are an eligible expense
- Bank financing is not required, but encouraged for larger projects
- Public funds from other programs can be used for the balance of the project

OCLDC approved investment of up to \$80,000 to be used for up to ten Oneida County residents (\$8,000 per person), who reside outside the City of Utica, for enrollment in the Tech Corps program. To date 15 individuals have participated in the program. Two of the individuals have already been hired by Wolfspeed, with another in the pipeline.

MV Tech Corps

MV Tech Corps is a cohort opportunity that makes use of intense, individualized personal and employment counseling to allow students to earn an MVCC tech and trades certificate at no cost in eight months from the start.

Students can choose to take courses in:

- Mechatronics: prepares students for work in automated manufacturing settings (e.g. CREE).
- Welding: prepares students for structural and metal fabrication welding work (e.g. Briggs & Stratton).
- Carpentry/Masonry: prepares students for work as skilled laborers in the residential and commercial construction trades industries.
- CNC Machinist Technology: prepares students for employment in general machine shops and CNC manufacturing.

Classes begin Feb. 2, 2021! Seats are limited!



Eligibility Requirements:

- Be 17-24 years old
- · Be a current resident of Oneida County
- · Be a U.S. citizen, permanent resident, or citizen of a U.S. territory

Students who complete their program will receive SUNYrecognized certificates* and be guaranteed job interviews with Briggs and Stratton in Sherrill, N.Y., and Cree Wolfspeed in Marcy, N.Y.

*Students must have a high school diploma or its equivalent to receive an MVCC certificate.



Project Title: Growth of the CenterState NY Smart Systems Cluster

Region (applicant-defined): CenterState New York

Cluster Sector(s): Information Technology; Business and Technical Services

Project Description:

The CenterState NY Smart Systems coalition, led by the CenterState Corporation for Economic Opportunity, aims to support the successful development of the unmanned aerial systems cluster in Central New York. Tied directly to New York state's semiconductor corridor effort, the coalition's strategy consists of a two-pronged approach: developing new, large-scale, inclusive training and entrepreneurship opportunities; and leveraging and scaling successful equity-based initiatives focused on inclusive workforce and small business development. If provided an implementation grant, the coalition proposes to prioritize eight interconnected smart systems cluster projects with a vision for achieving equitable economic growth in the region.

Phased Application Process

Phase 1: Develop transformational, regional economic development strategies

• \$500,000 per regional application (60 regional applications awarded out of 500+ applications)

Regions can apply for Phase 2

Phase 2: Implement Phase 1 strategies that will create and grow regional growth clusters

- \$25M \$75M (up to \$100M) per regional application
- 20-30 regional applications to be awarded

Vision for a Vibrant Smart Systems Cluster

- Supporting the growth of existing Smart Systems industries by investing in the development of emerging market verticals such as UAS and Smart Cities;
- Bringing geo-political resiliency and security to the Cluster supply chain through the development, and expansion, of trusted semiconductor chip manufacturing facilities;
- Making investments in quantum computing to improve both the volume of processing power and the security of data that is processed within IoT;
- Spreading the economic benefits of the Smart Systems cluster to residents of both urban and rural geographies, especially those from historically marginalized populations, through large-scale workforce training to access quality jobs and startup assistance across the full life cycle of business formation, growth, and expansion.


